The OPAA Spring Training will be held April 17 – 18 at the Hilton Polaris.

Introduced

<u>House Bill 96 (Biennial Budget)</u> sponsored by Rep. Stewart enacts the state operating budget.

<u>House Bill 36 (Execution Methods – Nitrogen Hypoxia)</u> sponsored by Reps. Stewart and Plummer adds nitrogen hypoxia as a method of execution and prohibits the disclosure of execution identifying information.

House Bill 72 (Abolish Death Penalty) sponsored by Reps. Schmidt and Mathews prohibits public funding for lethal injection drugs, abolishes the death penalty, and modifies the number of jurors that may be challenged in cases where a defendant may be sentenced to life imprisonment.

<u>House Bill 88 (Drug Trafficking Penalties)</u> sponsored by Reps. Abrams and Plummer increases the penalties for drug trafficking above certain amounts and prohibits organized trafficking of persons.

<u>Senate Bill 86 (Hemp Regulation)</u> sponsored by Sens. Huffman and Wilkin generally prohibits the sale of intoxicating hemp products, except for sales at licensed dispensaries, regulates drinkable cannabinoid products.

<u>House Bill 47 (Human Trafficking Penalties)</u> sponsored by Reps. Williams and Santucci enacts the Human Trafficking Prevention Act to increase the penalty for human trafficking of a minor or person with a developmental disability, kidnapping, and abduction.

House Bill 84 (Obscene Material/Age Verification) sponsored by Reps. Demetriou and Williams prohibits an organization from failing to verify the age of a person attempting to access material that is obscene or harmful to juveniles, prohibits a person from using another person's likeness to create sexual images of the other person, and creates a private right of action for each prohibited activity.

<u>Senate Bill 64 (Animal Cruelty)</u> sponsored by Sen. Cutrona increases the penalties for violating companion animal cruelty offenses and prohibits a felony animal abuse offender from owning a companion animal in certain circumstances.

House Bill 31 (Record Parole Board Hearings) sponsored by Reps. Stewart and Humphrey requires electronic recordings to be made of all parole board hearings and to make electronic recordings of full parole board hearings public records.

House Bill 68 (Concealed Carry/Firearms Disability Relief) sponsored by Reps. Mathews and Pizzulli allows a concealed handgun licensee to carry a handgun in a building or structure that is not a courthouse but in which a courtroom is located in specified circumstances and permits a nonresident of Ohio to obtain statutory relief from firearms disability based on an Ohio conviction, guilty plea, or delinquent child adjudication.

<u>House Bill 76 (Increasing Township Trustee Membership)</u> sponsored by Reps. Lorenz and Baker allows the electors of certain townships to increase the membership of their boards of township trustees.

<u>House Bill 79 (Assaulting a Sports Official)</u> sponsored by Reps. Roemer and J. Miller increases the penalties for assault if the victim is acting as a sports official or the assault is committed in retaliation for the victim's actions as a sports official.

<u>House Bill 82 (Construction Zones – Penalties)</u> sponsored by Reps. Click and Johnson provides for increased penalties and driver education for traffic offenses in construction zones.

<u>House Bill 86 (Tax Foreclosures/Land Reutilization)</u> sponsored by Rep. Demetriou and <u>Senate Bill 102 (Tax Foreclosures/Land Reutilization)</u> sponsored by Sen. Patton makes changes to the law relating to tax foreclosures and county land reutilization corporations.

<u>Senate Bill 97 (Penalty – Failure to Yield to Funeral Procession)</u> sponsored by Sens. Craig and Wilson doubles the fines for failing to yield to a funeral procession.
